### Growers of Pulses for Export to India Cautioned on Standards

Farmers who are ready to cultivate pulses in Tanzania, Malawi and Kenya have been cautioned over growing the crop in a conducive environment and produce food that will not cause harm to consumers in the Indian market which is currently eyeing to buy 5 million tonnes. The caution was given by the Eastern Africa Grain Council (EAGC) Tanzania Country Director Julius Wambura at a consultation meeting on “Supporting Indian Trade and Investment for Africa” (SITA ) project undertaken by the International Trade Centre (ITC) together with UK Aid. Currently Tanzania has been a critical player in producing pulses for the world market ranking the 10th largest producer and the second in Africa after Nigeria, but in terms of yields it ranks the 112 positions in the world by producing 8.9 hectograms per ha..

### Chinese Government to Build High Speed Railway for Tanzania

The Chinese government plans to construct in the future high speed railway in Tanzania and other priority business partner countries as a way of bolstering economic relations with them. The project would be part of China’s Belt and Road Initiative that is championed by China’s President Xi Jinping in October this year. China and Tanzania’s economic relations date back to the 70s where China built the Tanzania Zambia Railway (Tazara) which is still functioning todate. Since then China has made significant number of investments including the recent oil and gas transporting project in the East African nation and have maintained strong business ties for many years. China invested over USD120bn in Africa in 2014 and at present it has injected USD15bn in Tanzania.

### National Development Corporation (NDC), Singapore Take to Palm Oil Production in Coast Region

National Development Corporation (NDC) head of agro-industries said that the project will be implemented in partnership with a strategic investor. So far the NDC has already acquired an investor from Singapore who will take the task of implementing the project. He detailed that the investor known as Navabharat PTY Limited will invest a whopping USD111m to the project together with modern technology that would facilitate to enhance production of the planned palm oil. Currently about 60 percent of oil which is consumed in Tanzania is imported and it costs a huge sum of money, hence the project shall help to save the budget, but also will help to obtain foreign exchange from the oil which will be exported. The project will contribute to the production of 10MW of electricity which will be produced from palm burgesses (remains) after industrial processes. The electricity that would be produced from the project will be connected to the national grid to enhance the availability of electricity which is still the main challenge.

### Tanzania Becomes East, Central and Southern Africa Fiber Optic Information Hub

Tanzania Telecommunication Company Limited (TTCL) plans to make its fiber optic cable to be the information hub in east, central as well as southern Africa. The TTCL acting Chief Executive Officer said currently, nearly all neighbouring countries depend on the TTCL fiber connectivity as a source of information. These are Burundi, Rwanda, Zambia, Malawi, Kenya and Uganda. Under the plans, TTCL has will ensure that all countries in east, central and southern Africa—particularly the Southern African Development Community (SADC) use the TTCL fiber optic cable as the hub of information. He explained that the move aims to bring about revolution in the economy and technology, hence increase fast economic growth to the nation.

**Chinese Government Sponsors 22 More Tanzanians in Oil and Gas Courses**

The government of China has offered sponsorship for 22 Tanzanians students who will pursue oil and gas courses, the Ministry of Energy and Minerals has revealed. Already the qualified students have left the country for studies at the China University of Geosciences (Wuhan). The scholarships were processed in collaboration with the Embassy of China in Tanzania and applicants were required to pay for air tickets, while other costs were to be paid by the government of China. At least 25,000 people will require training at technical and vocational level as well as higher education in the East African region.

**Tanzania Now to Invite Investors in Wind and Solar Energy Production**

The government is seeking investors who will advance production and supply of wind and solar power by tendering system. The investor should be competitive in both power projects with a good and reliable technology to accelerate supply. Among other things the companies will be responsible to produce electricity and to connect regions to the grid. Energy and Water Utility Regulatory Authority (Ewura) Director of Electricity has said currently, the demand for electricity is very high compared to the sources of electricity available, he explained, adding that the government itself cannot handle the cost of implementing both power projects across the country.
